



Pupil Premium Grant Spending Statement 2016-17

Allocation, Purpose and Proposal for spending

Overview

Introduced in **April 2011**, the pupil premium is allocated to children who are looked after by the local authority, those who have been eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years (also known as Ever 6 FSM) and for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces.

How is the PPG spent?

- We will use the pupil premium grant in ways we think will best support the raising of attainment for the most vulnerable pupils.
- Our priority in the academic year 2015-16 has been focussed on 'narrowing the gap' for those pupils not on track to achieve 'Expected Standard' at the end of KS1 and 'Expected Standard' the end of Key Stage 2 as well as supporting children in other classes who might not achieve as well as their peers.
- The premium is provided in order to support these pupils in reaching their potential.
- We recognise that not all pupils who are disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals and, therefore, reserve the right to allocate Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being vulnerable.

- The schools ethos is for all children to achieve their fullest potential

Barriers to learning for Disadvantaged pupils

- Historical gaps between PP and Non PP
- Gaps between PP and Non PP in EYFS remaining large
- Gaps between PP and Non PP in KS1 remaining large
- Disadvantaged Pupils admitted to school in Y5 and Y6 with large gaps.

Teaching Assistants	All classes have TA support. Teaching Assistants support pupils through targeted interventions, individually and in small groups. Staff receive training to support their work with vulnerable pupils
Reading manager	To co-ordinate support for disadvantaged pupils though: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - analysis of reading data - co-ordination of reading interventions - co-ordination of reading volunteers - supporting pupils to access the library - providing individual feedback regarding accessing the Accelerated Reader Scheme - Assessing pupils for Iren's/dyslexia - Multi-sensory phonics intervention
Maths Manager	To co-ordinate support for disadvantaged pupils though: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - analysis of Rockstar Maths data - co-ordination of Maths interventions - Maths interventions
Additional Part-time teacher	Targeted to work with Disadvantaged pupils in Y5 and Y6
Pupil and Family Liaison Officer	To support vulnerable pupils and families. 4 CAF's, attendance monitoring ,individual and small group work.
1:1 Marking time	Additional time allocated to Y5 and Y6 teachers to have extended marking times with pupils.

Continuing Professional Development	for all staff to support pupils with barriers to learning e.g. bereavement training
Deputy Head	Designated LAC teacher Y5 Maths booster for under attaining disadvantaged pupils.

Walking Bus and Early Bird Club: Pupils:	To help improve attendance, punctuality or achievement for selected pupils and/or support families for a limited period.

Booster Groups	Conducted by Headteacher, Deputy Headteacher, Year 6 teacher
Deeper learning	Maths and writing groups within the Great Heights cluster

Educational visits	To enhance topic and life experiences. These trips are subsidised for disadvantaged pupils.
Y4 and Y6 residential visits -	Nell Bank and Kingswood trips are subsidised for disadvantaged pupils.
Visits to school-	Enrichment visitors such as drama groups to enhance experiences for disadvantaged pupils.
Extra-Curricular provision	Range of clubs provided at lunchtime and after school. E.g. Young Voices, choir, cricket club

Educational Psychology Service	Additional sessions purchased to support Disadvantaged pupils.
ESCAP Counselling services	Course of counselling sessions for 2 pupils

Pupil and Family Liaison Officer	Supporting families in a number of ways including <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Informal drop in support - Support for low attendance - CAF's - Signpost to agencies and other sources of support

School Uniform	Pupils in receipt of the PPG receive a uniform voucher.
Free School Milk	All children who are entitled to FSM are also entitled to free milk
