PROSPECTUS



Russell Hall Primary School is situated on the main Bradford-Halifax road. We cater for boys and girls between the ages of 3 and 11 years. We are a one form entry primary school with a large Nursery that afternoon places. Our Nursery Class offers part-time provision for children from the age of three years before they enter Primary School in the year they are 5. Classes are organised in year groups.

Admission arrangements

Children are admitted to Nursery, subject to there being a place available, the term after they turn 3. Admissions to school are subject to the criteria stated in our admissions policy a copy of which can be obtained through the Office or is available to view on our website <u>www.russellhallprimary.co.uk</u>.

The Curriculum

The school curriculum consists of the planned activities that we organise in order to promote learning and personal growth and development. It covers the formal requirements of the Early Years Statutory Framework and the National Curriculum and provides enrichment experiences for the children such as visits to museums, sporting events, residential experiences and visiting musicians and theatre groups. It also includes what the children learn from the way they are treated and expected to behave. We aim to teach children how to grow into positive, responsible people, who can work and co-operate with others while developing knowledge and skills, so that they achieve their full potential. At the beginning of each half term parents are given an overview of the curriculum detailing the themes/topic that will be taught for their child's year group. Our phonics teaching follows Little Wandle Letters and Sounds revised and the children in reception and year 1 take home books from this scheme. Teachers are happy to discuss any aspect of the curriculum and to provide further information and support to parents. Children who are secure at decoding and can read with fluency use the Accelerated Reader reading scheme to help them decide on appropriate books to read, matched to their ability.

Music

We currently provide music tuition through vocal coaching sessions in years 3 and 6, Brass for year 4, African drumming/Samba for year 5 and brass tuition for pupils in years 5 and 6. In addition to this we have a school choir (Young Voices) for KS2 pupils. We engage professional musicians to perform music from different genres to broaden the children's musical experiences. Children sing during assemblies and enjoy singing collectively once a week.

Sport

Russell Hall offers its full time pupils two hours of PE provision each week. In year 5 the pupils have a weekly swimming lesson as part of their PE curriculum. We are involved in sports festivals with local schools which include football, rugby, cricket, cross-country running, swimming and athletics events, to name a few.

Sex and Relationships Education forms a part of our PSHCE curriculum and covers friendships, relationships and changes. As part of this, in years 2, 4 and 6 children learn about the physical and emotional changes that occur during puberty. Parents are able to view the materials used in school on our school website and to discuss the programme with the teachers and PSHCE lead Mrs Reilly.

Special Educational Needs Provision

We aim that all children will have full access to the Early Years Foundation Stage and the National Curriculum and every opportunity to access new and exciting experiences. Children's progress is regularly assessed and where appropriate, work is planned around a child's particular needs to support them to make progress. We meet regularly with parents to ensure you are kept informed and involved as much as possible so we can work together to support your child. Our school SENCO is Miss Bailey and Assistant SENCo Miss Douthwaite.

More Able

We aim to offer opportunities through our curriculum provision for children to realise their potential. This is delivered through differentiated lesson planning, small group work and activities that extend the learning of our more able pupils. We encourage pupils to tell us about their achievements both in school and outside. Please let us know if your child has a particular talent or achievement in any area.

Equal Opportunities

At Russell Hall Primary School we value the individuality of all of our children. We are committed to giving all our children every opportunity to achieve their highest potential. We do this by taking account of pupils' varied experiences and needs. We offer a broad and balanced curriculum, and have high expectations of all children.

Pupil Progress

Parents receive a written report on their child's progress on a termly basis and have an opportunity to discuss their progress at Parent's Evenings in the Autumn and Spring terms. Teachers are happy to discuss progress and ways parents can support their child's education at any time – please make an appointment through the Office. We value support from parents and aim to build good partnerships between home and school as we believe this is crucial to developing each child's potential.

Standards

Teacher assessment is undertaken regularly and children's progress and attainment are monitored carefully. Information is shared with parents each term. Formal assessments (SATs) are undertaken by children at the end of Year 2 and Year 6. Results are available on the DfE website:

Children in Year 1 are also screened in the Knowledge of Phonics at the end of Year 1 and again at the end of Year 2, if they have not met the standard. On entry to Reception children complete the Reception Baseline Assessment, which is a short task-based assessment the children complete with their teacher.

The school holds a **Heritage schools award** and the **Activemark** and in 2012 were awarded the **ArtsMark** from the Arts Council to recognise the quality of the Arts provision in school.

Ofsted

The school was inspected in March 2020 and were judged to be good.

Behaviour

Ofsted reported that "there are high expectations of every pupil. As a result behaviour is a strength of the school".

We are really proud of how children at Russell Hall conduct themselves and we often receive feedback from visitors and whilst on school trips, relating to how polite and sensible our children are. Further to this and linked to our school logo and vision statement, we encourage our children to develop good learning behaviours that will enable them to be 'Lifelong Learners'. Children are encouraged to make good use of the following Learning Muscles; collaboration, curiosity, perseverance, resourcefulness, respect and reflection.

Bullying

We recognise that Bullying can come in different forms but the term 'bullying' is often used incorrectly. At times, children are unkind to others, but we teach children that 'bullying' is defined as **repeated** unkindness by an individual or group towards another, which causes distress. Here is a definition created **by** children that we use with children:

'Bullying is picking on someone over time. It can be saying unkind things to them, shouting at them, lying about them or twisting their words to get them in to trouble. It could be when someone persuades another to do bad things by threatening them or taking things from them. It might be hurting someone on the outside or on the inside. This might be done face-to-face, on paper, through texts or over the phone or internet.'

We teach children that the most effective way to **stop** bullying is to **tell** an adult. For more information, please refer to school's Anti-Bullying Policy.

School are credited as a Stonewall Champion school as staff are trained to deal with homophobic bullying.

Pastoral Care

The progress and welfare of each pupil is a core element of the care provide by the staff of the School, (Class-Teacher, Headteacher and Ancillary Staff), as well as visiting staff, (School Doctors, Nurses and others), who welcome a close liaison with the home. There are a number of staff who hold a first-aid qualification. Our Pupil and Family Liaison Officer, Claire Hargrave is happy to help if you have any questions or need any advice or support. Mobile phones

We do not allow children to bring mobile phones to school. If you feel unhappy with your child walking to school without a mobile phone, you would need to accompany them.

Medicines

Where learners have been prescribed medications by a doctor or other appropriately qualified health care professional, the school has established procedures to ensure these needs are met. Please call in to speak to Mrs Kenny or Mrs McKinley who will discuss these with you. If your child has asthma please ensure an inhaler is available in school at all times. These are stored securely in the Office.

Safeguarding

No child should suffer harm either at home or school. Everyone who works in our school has a responsibility to make sure that all our young people are safe. Staff undertake regular training to ensure that procedures are up to date with latest legislation. Everyone who works at the school, or who volunteers on a regular basis, undergoes a DBS check (Disclosure and Barring Service). The designated members of staff with a responsibility for Safeguarding are Mr Grant (Headteacher), Miss Bailey (Deputy Headteacher), Mrs Smith (EYFS and KS1 Lead) and Mrs Hargrave (FAPLO).

All staff are trained in Child Protection and the prevention of Extremism and Radicalisation in young people.

Security and safety

The school gates are closed at 8:15am each morning and opened again at 3:30pm each afternoon in order that vehicles can have access. Children are welcome to arrive in the playground up to 15 minutes before school starts, but should be accompanied by an adult as the school cannot provide supervision before 8:55am when school starts. The bell will ring at 8:50am to give time for children to line up. Visitors to the school should come to the Office. If you are late to collect your child please telephone the Office as soon as possible. Children are told to return to the Office if they cannot find the adult who is collecting them. All children are accompanied to the playground by an adult at the end of each day.

Homework

We believe that homework is important and a valuable part of the children's learning. We aim to offer information sessions for parents to help keep you up to date with the changes in education such as the increasing emphasis on phonics and the new strategies for maths. Please see the school website for a copy of the Homework Policy, which outlines the expectations for different year groups.

Nursery

Nursery sessions offer 15 hours of free provision. The sessions are from 12:15pm to 3:15pm, Monday to Friday.

Attendance and Punctuality

The school day starts at 8.50 and finishes at 3.10 p.m. Pupils have an hour for lunch. We request that children arrive on time for the start of the day and are collected promptly and that they attend every day. Children who miss a lot of school make less progress than children who attend regularly and punctually. They also miss out on friendships and find routines more difficult to follow. They find it harder to develop a work ethic and find learning more challenging as they have not been fully involved in their lessons from the beginning, when the purpose of the lesson is made clear. The hours spent on teaching in a normal school week (excluding the statutory daily act of collective worship,

registration and lunch and other breaks) is 22.5 hours for children in Reception and Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2) and 23.75 hours for Key Stage 2 pupils.

We monitor levels of attendance and punctuality and where a problem is identified, we offer support for parents to improve this, or enlist the help of the Education Social Worker. We operate a first day calling system so we can be quickly aware of why pupils are absent.

We are grateful to the vast majority of parents who keep us informed of absences and who seek to minimise absence from school, including refraining from taking holidays in term time.

Parents receive a written report at the end of the year and are informed of the percentage absence for their child. The school encourages regular attendance as the first ingredient of a successful school life. Parents wishing to have absences authorised by the school should contact Mr Grant in writing. The Legislation makes it very clear that Headteachers **may not grant any leave of absence during term time for holidays.**

Attendance/Term Time Holidays

In view of this decision all three schools in Queensbury have agreed to support families by aiming to keep the two weeks holiday at Spring Bank. Many families have commented that this is a good time to take advantage of cheaper holidays when others are back at school, thus avoiding their children missing part of their education.

We acknowledge that there may be occasions **other than holidays** when you cannot avoid withdrawing your child from school. Only in these exceptional circumstances will Headteachers be able to consider authorising the absence. All requests for leave during term time must be applied for using the forms on our school website.

Collective Worship

We have a daily act of collective worship which is the requirement for all schools. Our local Church delivers "Open the Book" once a month to Reception and Key Stage 1 and the Vicar of the Church delivers assembly once every half term for Key Stage 2.

Assemblies

On Fridays we hold a family **Celebrations Assembly** where we celebrate children's achievements and hand out awards. Parents are notified by text when their child/ren are noted in the Head teachers Honours Book. Children are welcome to bring awards that they have



received outside of school such as football trophies, music awards or brownie badges. These are celebrated at this time also. We also hold assemblies for parents to share the work of each class. These assemblies give us the chance to show you some of the great work that is happening in school.

Use of photographs and video footage

During the school year there are a number of productions and sporting events etc where parents/carers may wish to take videos or photographs of their child's involvement. The school Governors are happy for parents/carers to do this for their personal use. These photographs/videos are not for sale under any circumstances.

Please note that photographs/videos of children other than your own should never be put on-line (e.g. Facebook or other social network sites) without the permission of the parents/carers of the other child/ren.

School staff may take photographs/video footage of children as part of a curriculum activity or for display purposes in school. Should any parent object to their child being videoed or photographed they should contact the Headteacher and the school will operate a total ban for that particular performance/event/activity.

Visits and trips

Class-work is often enriched by educational journeys beyond the local environment. Where expenses (entrance fees etc.) are incurred the school requests voluntary contributions from parents. We have also been able to provide residential visits for children in year 4 and year 6. Further details of our Charging and Remissions policy are available to view on our website. All trips can now be paid for on our Parent Pay site.

School dinners, snacks, milk and fruit

All our school meals are prepared and cooked fresh on site each day. Children can choose what they want each day from a range of cooked meals and sandwiches. Our menu is posted on the Noticeboard. Pupils can also bring own their own sandwiches. Milk is free to pupils in Nursery and Reception and available to purchase for pupils in years 1 to 6. Free fruit is available each day to pupils in Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1 through the Government's '5-a-day School Scheme'. All pupils can have water on request. Children in Key Stage 2 may bring a piece of fresh fruit for the morning break, which we ask them to label or put in a named bag.

Free School Meals (free meals for Reception and KS1)

In England, children are eligible to receive free school meals (FSM) if their parents are in receipt of any of the following benefits. Pupils who are eligible may also get support with costs for uniform:

- Income Support
- Income-based Job Seekers' Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the Guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs.
- Please note from September 2014, ALL CHILDREN IN RECEPTION AND KEY STAGE 1 will be provided with a free meal. However, if you are eligible for free school meals you will still need to register. This enables school to access funding that benefits your child.

By registering for free school meals, you can also access your uniform voucher which you can collect from the school office.

The Government recognises the benefits of healthy school meals and is committed to continuing to provide free school meals to families who need them. Healthy school meals can help to improve children's readiness to learn and their behaviour at school, and can also help to establish healthy eating habits for life. Parent Helpers and Volunteers

We believe that parents have an important role to play in the education of their children and we encourage you to become involved in the life of the school. Some parents help on visits, others offer to help in school when they have regular time to spare. Voluntary work in school is subject to a satisfactory report from the DBS. We recognise that not all parents can come into school and we try to keep you as informed as possible through text service and letter. These are sent home in the book bags, so please check these daily. They will also be available on the school website if you lose your copy.

School Workforce

All children in Years 5 and 6 have a job in school which gives them a sense of responsibility. Each year pupils in years 3 to 6 are chosen to be School Councillors who represent their peers and represent the school at key events. We also have a number of children who are 'Buddies'. These pupils are role models to the rest of the children and offer support and friendship at assemblies, school events and especially at playtimes. Other roles include Peace Pals, Eco Warriors and Digital Leaders.

Curriculum development is regarded by all staff as being of high priority and work with consultants, discussions and in-service courses help us to keep abreast of educational developments and national and local education policies.

Complaints Procedures

We hope that your time at Russell Hall will be memorable and happy. However, occasionally there are concerns raised by parents. If parents do have concerns regarding any aspect of school then we would appreciate knowing at an early stage so that we can help to alleviate any potential problems. Please do not hesitate to contact school if you or your child has concerns, even if they seem minor. Our priority is to address issues as soon as they arise. It is hoped that parents will bring these concerns to the teacher or Headteacher and there will be a satisfactory outcome. In the event of parents not being satisfied with the outcome or feeling they are unable to discuss the concerns with the Headteacher, then there are alternative channels to go through. Parents are able to make representation to the Department for Education (DfE).

We want children to create an excellent first impression and be ambassadors for the school, so we request that school uniform be adhered to at all times.

For health and safety reasons, children with pierced ears should only wear small stud earrings for school. A working watch is also permitted but no other jewellery please.

School uniform can be purchased in the following ways:- order form through school or at the shop EiH Ltd, Clayton Heights (next to Patchetts).

If you are entitled to and registered for FSM, please call into the office and collect your uniform voucher.

We will provide a book bag for each child when they start school.
